## In loving memory of Elvira "Vi" Maud (Bellows) Scott (1930-2022)

Our church community is mourning the death of our longtime member, neighbor and friend, Vi. She died on Sat. Aug. 20, 2022 at the age of 92. A memorial service was held Saturday, Aug. 27, at 11:00 am at our church with refreshments provided in the church hall immediately following the service. There are no calling hours and burial will be private.

Born May 12, 1930, the daughter of Rollen & Belle (Rhood) Bellows. Vi attended the East Hawley School, graduated from Charlemont High School in 1947 and graduated with a Bachelor's degree from North Adams State College in 1951. Vi was a teacher in the Athol school system from 1951 until her retirement in 1985.

Vi married Clark "Jack" Scott on December 27, 1964 here in Buckland officiated by our church's pastor at that time, Rev. Eric Bascom Sr.

She was an ever present and decades-long contributor to Mary Lyon Church. She was our Clerk for as long as anyone can remember, only stepping down a couple of years ago. She was at all our public suppers as a member of the Work Committee. She'd be sitting at the door collecting money and marking off reservations and when that task was through, she'd be in the kitchen making sure the meal and desserts were going as they should. If they were not, she was not shy about saying so. She was at every bake sale and band concert. She was helping at every after-funeral reception.

Vi and our dear friend and MLC member, the late Edie (Scott) Gerry. were best friends as well as sister-in-laws. Vi's husband Jack was Edie's brother. For decades Vi and Edie were rarely apart when it came to the church. They were the driving forces of the Ladies' Club, the Monday Nighters quilting group, they organized the quilt shows, and the annual Silver Bell Bazaar. Vi was always present to arrange the Easter flowers and the Thanksgiving cornucopia in the sanctuary. She made sure there were special collections for Blanket Sunday and for many years she was the liaison, delivery person, and on-site volunteer for the Hilltown Churchs' Food Pantry. She made sure everyone was informed on Sunday mornings during announcement time with updates from the Missions Committee and she gave tallies of funds raised at various church events. She collected

and distributed the mail. She did it all...She was a remarkable woman. We will miss her so much.

# THE LIVING LANDSCAPES OF ROBERT STRONG WOODWARD

An exhibition of paintings by the Friends of Robert Strong Woodward in collaboration with Pocumtuck Valley Memorial Association at MEMORIAL HALL MUSEUM 10 MEMORIAL STREET DEERFIELD MASS 01342 SEPTEMBER 10 - OCTOBER 30 (CLOSED MONDAYS) 11 AM TO 4:30 PM

As many of you know, Robert Strong Woodward (1885 - 1957) was a noted 20<sup>th</sup> century landscape artist who lived just down the street from our church at the Southwick place, now Fernbank Farm.

His life was marked by an almost surreal series of tragedies. At 21, an accidental self-inflicted gunshot injury nearly ended his life, and left him permanently paralyzed from the chest down. Over the course of his career, three of Woodward's studios and one of his homes were destroyed by fire. Yet he persevered.

His art was recognized, admired, and collected across America during his lifetime, by such luminaries as Jack Benny, Robert Frost, and George Burns and Gracie Allen. Woodward was recognized by critics and he was awarded many prizes, including the First Hallgarten Prize for the best artist under the age of 35, and the Boston Tercentenary Exhibition Gold Medal in 1930. One critic, subtly alluding to Woodward's disability, applauded his work as having "the power, grace, and brilliance which might glow from an energetic man, determined to tell people what a magnificent joy he has in painting, and what glory can be snatched from a bit of woodland." Another declared that Woodward had become "the poet in paint of his own locale."

What's wonderful about this upcoming exhibition is that a good many of the paintings have not been exhibited since the 1930s, have never been exhibited at all, or have just been discovered! You won't want to miss this superb treat for the eyes.
